PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Hello from North Carolina,

I want to take this opportunity to talk a bit about expanding your training comfort zone. I plan to be doing plenty of this at the upcoming CSAR seminar in Missouri, but you all should be doing this routinely so that you don't get stuck in a rut with your canine.

I feel that comfort zone expansion is one of the most important parts of SAR training. It can be applied to all aspects of SAR. Some of you are probably asking what comfort zone expansion is. Comfort zone expansion is: doing things in training to test yourself, your dog, your gear and your abilities in a semi-controlled environment. In other words it lets you test the things that may save you or the life of your missing subject while still having a safe "bailout".

At a past CSAR seminar, on the third day, it rained really hard. A couple of my students thought that this meant that we would go inside or finish class early. However, I saw this as a package of opportunities:

What better time to test our rain gear and see if it really worked

How do we know what rain does to scent if we've never worked in the rain

How will our dogs react to foul weather

Is my pack really waterproof?

Does heavy cloud cover affect my GPS?

How long do footprints really last in the rain

- Utilizing a scent article
- Searching without a scent article
- Segmenting a search area
- Training in town
- Stream crossings
- Going to the "potty" in the woods
- Subjects who are
 - Moving
 - Unresponsive
 - Don't like dogs
 - Nonverbal
 - Out-of-sight
- Working your dog off/on lead
- Visual tracking
- Looking for clues
- Mock press interviews
- Air scenting with a trailing dog
- Tracking with an air scent dog
- And many others

I could make the above list much longer, but I hope that these ideas will open your mind for new training for you and your dog.

A UNSPOKEN SEMINAR BENEFIT

CSR's annual seminar is coming up shortly this September. #1 You go to learn to be a better dog handler #2...and this is an aside..one of the great things to come out of a seminar that is attended by people from all over the US is not only to learn more about dog handling but to meet others in the same boat as yourself. In 24 yrs of going to seminar, one of the very BEST things you come away with is meeting other handlers - beginning and experienced. I have worked my dog, put the dog up and then flanked other dogs - why????Doesn't take too long before you observe and recognize a handler that you wouldn't hesitate to call should you need an assist or just one that you can contact for info about the best way to approach a certain search.

One of the unspoken outcomes of attending a seminar is the networking that can come out of it. When Carolyn first asked me to write about networking, I realized that ALL teams do not network. If you do not, you can be missing the boat. My team, Illinois Wisconsin Search & Rescue Dogs just spent a 3 day weekend up at Stevens Point, Wisconsin in a joint training. We did this with Minnesota Search & Rescue Dog Association. The two teams go way back to being in on a joint search in 1991 up north in Minnesota. We have networked ever since and our 3 day campout has become an annual joint thing. They have called us when they were dog short and we have called them. You must realize that often when you are called, the agency calling you has NO clue as to how many dogs they actually need - early on we were called up north for a missing woman. When the request came thru, that Sheriff asked for "One to two dogs" When I asked him what the area was he said "12,000 of National Forest" (A good time to network)

You will find at seminars, handlers will come and go - you will see those with all the bells and whistles in the newest search gear...and after that first year, they will disappear forever. It has either become "Too hard" or that first seminar will be the ONLY one they will ever need to go to "I know it all now" You will also meet people that while they have just the basic gear, they have that innate something that says "I will keep on learning"....and "I will never give up"

Make the most of your seminar time - WATCH & LISTEN. Learn for and to who you would want to call for an assist - and who you would want to call to bounce an idea off them.

CANINE SEARCH & RECOVERY'S BILL TOLHURST AWARD

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MEMBERSHIP QUESTIONS and ANSWERS

We continue to get questions about when dues are due, who can sponsor a new member, how long it takes to be voted on for membership, and what to do if a prospective member doesn't have a sponsor.

Dues are due every January 1. It doesn't matter when you originally joined CSAR, after the first year - or piece of, your dues are due on Jan 1. If not paid by March, a reminder letter will be sent and if still unpaid ninety days later, you will be dropped from CSAR membership. If your membership lapses, you must reapply for membership to CSAR.

Who can sponsor a new member. A new standing rule was adopted by the CSAR membership in October 2002, stating that a sponsor must be a member in good standing for at least a year before sponsoring new members.

How long does it take to get voted into membership. This time frame can vary from a few weeks to a few months depending on when a membership application is received in regards to when the next newsletter is published. All proposed applicants are published in the CSAR newsletter for the entire membership to be aware of proposed new members.

What if I don't have a sponsor. We will try very hard to put an interested applicant in touch with a current CSAR member in their area. However, this is not always possible and a letter of recommendation from their agency on official letterhead or a resume of their SAR involvement can be substituted for a sponsor.

As we continue to visit with instructors, they are excited about working with CSAR seminar participants and helping you to become a better handler and partner for your canine. We've heard lots of exciting things being planned for the week of training that will be not only great learning opportunities, but challenging to all.

hard to find requirement for volunteer handlers.

Not only are we in a new geographical area for the CSAR seminar, but we have some additional opportunities that all participants need to be aware of during the seminar.

Camp Lakewood is a very big camp and CSAR will not be the only group using the camp during the week. This means that each and every one of us needs to be ambassadors not only for K9 search dogs but for SAR in general. Most likely the persons sharing the camp will be a school group so be prepared for lots of interest. This may be the first time many, if not all, of these folks have been introduced to SAR. Lets leave them with a good taste in their mouth.

Sharing the camp brings some opportunities that we can manipulate and some that we can't. Meal times and menu will be less flexible than they may have been in other years. Most of the meals will be served family style instead of buffet which we are accustomed to. This means the need to be present closer to the the start of meal time than the end of the meal hour.

Adult beverages are allowed after the training day ends. Camp administrators request that cans be kept covered if in the main camp area. As always, moderation is requested and expected. No adult beverages will be allowed in the dining hall during meals when campers other than CSAR are present.

RV parking is available, but there will be NO hook ups for electricity, water, etc. RV parking is limited and possibly not very level. Campers using RV's may wish to go to other camp grounds instead. Other information is available elsewhere in this newsletter.

Noise has been a concern for camp administrators, we have assured them they will be surprised at how quiet the dogs are.

The camp staff is excited about having Canine Search & Recovery host our annual seminar at their camp. As with many camps, this is the first time they have had a group like ours. Lets not make it the last!

WHAT DO I BRING FOR THE SEMINAR??

Whether this is your first seminar or you are a veteran SAR handler, preparation for a seminar is almost as important as actually attending.

What to bring falls into three main categories and can vary from seminar to seminar depending on the classes you intend to take, the time of year the seminar is being held, the location and the canine partner you are bringing. You need supplies for yourself, your canine partner and any specialty items needed for a specific class.

FOR YOURSELF: Bring plenty of comfortable and sturdy clothes, whether fatigues, uniforms or just everyday clothes. They need to be comfortable, you are attending the seminar to work your dog - not set the fashion trend of the year. Be prepared for any and all climates the area where you are training may present. Rain gear is a must, after all searches go on rain or shine - so does training! Navigational items such as compasses, radios, GPS's and maps are also important. Be sure to bring water containers for both you and your dog while working during the day.

Footwear is very important as you will spend a great deal of time on your feet during seminar week. Plenty of dry socks and at least one change of shoes/boots should be the minimum. Again, be aware of the terrain you may be working in and be prepared. We have heard from our friends from NC time and time again, just how important foot gear is to the SAR participant.

As usual, there will be the annual meeting and auction on Thursday night. If your team has a dress uniform you wish to wear, this is the time to do so with pride.

At Camp Lakewood, you will be sharing sleeping areas and rest room/shower facilities. Bring sleeping bags or sheets and blankets, pillows, personal toiletries, and other personal items you

may need. An extra blanket or heating pad can help on cool nights or if the nights are warm, a fan can bring a premium!

Think of the week as adults going to camp, if you are a midnight snacker - bring those snacks. Another suggestion for light sleepers are a pair of ear plugs to keep out unwanted noise. If you have a special diet that may not be easy for camp staff to fulfill, bring needed food as well.

FOR YOUR DOG: Food, bowls, water, medication, blankets, crate and tie outs are all necessities to make your dog's stay at the seminar a success. Don't forget about the poop scooping duty that every responsible SAR dog owner is responsible for.

Remember, dogs may not be left uncrated in your room. If you plan on having your dog in the room, a crate is a requirement.

In addition, you may want to bring a first aid kit which could be useful for both yourself and your dog. Other tried and true items are kapectate, baby enemas, and saline solution. In addition to your dog's basic provisions, bring the search gear your dog needs for the class you are planning to attend. Leads, harnesses, bells, collars, toys, treats and rewards should be part of your dog's travelling bag.

You will have to present a list of current vaccinations upon registration at the start of the seminar.

FOR THE AUCTION: We'd be amiss if we didn't remind you to bring items for the annual auction. Anything breed, SAR or dog related is great. Hand crafted items, gift certificates, state specialties - such as Wisconsin cheese are also popular auction items.

YOURSELF: Most importantly bring yourself and a willing and open mind. You may be given some ideas which you haven't thought about as far as training techniques or suggestions with which you aren't familiar. If you are uncomfortable, discuss this with your instructor. Be ready to hear a variety of ideas and suggestions, some of which will work for you and your current dog and some which may work for a future partner in training. Be ready to ask questions and expect answers that help you and your dog to become a better team.

Accommodations For RVs, Long Trailers, and Hotel

If you would like to drive your RV or long trailer to the seminar in MO, remember that there are NO hookups at Camp Lakewood. Generator use will be limited to certain hours during the day. Quiet hour starts at 10 p.m. and no generators will be running after that time. Also, level ground and space for parking large trailers and RVs is extremely limited.

I've located two local campgrounds with hookups that will accommodate larger trailers and RVs.

Huzzah Valley Resort, a private campground, is located 20 minutes west of Camp Lakewood on Highway 8. Price is \$12 per night for hookup plus \$9 per night per person. You can call 800.367.4516; write Huzzah Valley Resort 970 East Hwy 8 Steelville MO 65565; or view www.huzzahvalley.com.

Washington State Park is located 30 minutes north of Camp Lakewood on Highway 21. The price for hookup is \$16-\$20 per night. This beautiful park was once a ceremonial ground for prehistoric Indians. Their petroglyphs – rock carvings that are remnants of the culture – are a special attraction. Call 636.586.2995; write 13041 State Highway 104 DeSoto MO 63020; or view www.mostateparks.com.

If you like your privacy yet don't want to spend your fortune on fuel, consider the Super 8 in Potosi, just 10 minutes away from camp. The manager, Donna Valle, has given us a discount price of \$52 for single, \$55 for double, has waived the pet fee and will not charge us tax. Register by calling 573.438.8888 and mention you are with CSAR.

2008 CSAR Goes Green

In the spirit of preserving our natural resources, the CSAR Board has decided to no longer provide bottled water at seminars. Bottled water costs between \$1 and \$4 per gallon and 90 percent of the cost is in the bottle, lid and label. Eight out of ten plastic water bottles become landfill waste and take 700 years before they even begin to decompose. So, bring your own water containers – water coolers, gallon jugs, bottles, camel packs – and refill them for FREE from the numerous available faucets around Camp Lakewood.

Camp Lakewood will also provide recycling bins for aluminum, plastics, paper and cardboard. Meals will be served family style on REAL plates including washable utensils and cups. Bring your own travel mug for that last cup of coffee before you head off to training.

With the high cost of fuel, consider carpooling to the seminar and training areas. To reduce auto emissions and cut fuel costs, don't idle your engine. Idling 10 minutes less per day can keep 550 pounds of carbon dioxide out of the air every year. Think about bringing a bicycle to navigate around camp when not training. Last year in NC, Krysia Baron biked to the dining hall, showers and training classes!
